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## Learn About Home Dialysis During National Kidney Month (March 2008)

**Madison, Wisconsin**—Most people with kidney failure don't know they can get life-saving dialysis in the comfort of their own homes. Currently, fewer than 8% of U.S. dialysis patients do home treatments—but change is underway. In recent years, the number of programs offering nocturnal hemodialysis (done during sleep) have grown by 178%, from 73 in 2004, to 203 today. Daily home hemodialysis (done 5-7 days per week for 2-3 hours) had an astounding 530% increase, from 37 programs to 233. Each program site serves a radius of 120 miles or more. Peritoneal dialysis, which cleanses the blood using the membrane that lines the abdomen, increased about 10% in the same period.

March 2008, National Kidney Month, is a time to focus on the expanding options for dialysis at home. Patient-friendly home treatment options improve the lives of people with kidney failure. Home treatments are more convenient, and studies show that they are more effective. Patients report feeling better and having more energy. Home treatments are also more work-friendly.
